Fr. Tomasz's Weekly Reflection

In the parable Jesus tells in today's Gospel we are introduced to a Pharisee and a tax collector, both praying in the temple. They are both sinners, but there is a significant difference between them. The Pharisee is a man diligently fulfilling the so-called "religious duties": fasting and almsgiving, observing all the Laws. However, he is experiencing one significant problem, a problem with prayer, during which he seeks himself and his own perfection, instead of thinking about God. His problem with prayer reveals even greater struggle of his nature: the hypocrisy. Hypocrisy is always a manifestation of a lack of good will and by its very nature closes the door to Christ, obscuring the truth about oneself. Thus, it prevents the conversion. Jesus Christ explicitly criticizes such facade piety, which instead of developing a relationship with God, focuses on self-perfection. The Pharisee is an example of a man who becomes a collector of good deeds. What's more, he believes that this is enough for salvation.

On the other hand, the awareness of one's own weakness and insufficiency means that the tax collector, a man who is generally despised by his own countrymen because of the cooperation with the Roman invaders, does not look for anyone to blame, except for himself. Forgiveness can only be obtained by examining our own conscience, admitting to our own sins, and heartily repenting for them. It is a natural reflex of the heart under the influence of active grace. The tax collector from today's parable was therefore - like the Pharisee - a sinner, but a sinner aware of his inner state. This awareness allowed him for the repentance of his heart, which is a necessary condition for obtaining God's forgiveness. The Lord does not despise a contrite heart. The tax collector left, therefore, justified, for *whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted*.

With the coming of Jesus, a new chapter has begun in the relationship between God and man. Jesus wanted to participate in the dramatic - caused by sin - dialogue of love between God and man. The presence of Jesus among us, as the Son of God and the Son of Man, is a constant testimony of God's love for us, sinners. Jesus not only shows us how to live in love, how to love God and our neighbor, but also – through His death – makes love possible at all. In him, we experience that God loves us, and we are urged to respond with our love. Everyone who approaches love in their life is not only saved from eternal death, but also filled with love – can live the life of God himself.

We are aware that a doctor cannot effectively administer a therapy until the patient admits to a disease. God cannot forgive until a man acknowledges and brings his sins before Him, because the free will we have been given is an expression of God's love. It is worth having the Gospel parable of the Pharisee and the tax collector in front of us as an example, so as to not despise others by considering only ourselves to be just.


33 Days to Morning Glory
