QUESTIONS OF THE WEEK

First Reading

Peter's speech about the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus offers us a glimpse into the Church's earliest kerygma (oral proclamation) about Jesus. How is Peter's testimony persuasive to you? Can you share your Catholic faith with others using this kerygma?

Second Reading

Using the metaphors of yeast and unleavened bread, Paul viewed the death and resurrection of Jesus as bringing a new life of "sincerity and truth" to the community of believers. How does the celebration of Easter unite your family, your circle of Catholic friends and your community?

Gospel Reading

Mary Magdalene is the first to realize that Jesus had risen from the dead, and twice is told, "Do not be afraid." What fears are alleviated in your knowing that Jesus rose from the dead? How does the knowledge that Jesus's overcame the world help you during this difficult time?

PSALM



This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad. We celebrate Easter, the oldest and most important holiday for Christians every year. But maybe we got used to it, maybe it has become for us just one of the many days in the calendar. The same liturgy of the Sacred Triduum, Passion, Death, Grave, Resurrection. Maybe we needed this time to understand better the greatest secret of our Faith?

This year more than ever we understand the conversation between Jesus and the doubting Thomas: "*Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed.*" Are we like Thomas, demanding to see Jesus, requesting the possibility to place are hand in His side, our finger in the nail marks? Or are we the people of Faith Jesus is talking about? What do we even believe in?


This year's Easter reminds us, unlike any other time in the history of Salvation, that we cannot live our lives without Faith. We are reminded that even in the time of the great plague, in the period of the persecution, in the reign of darkness, there is one thing that can never be taken away from us, our Faith. But do we even have Faith?

The resurrection of Jesus Christ is a revolution, a complete overhaul of humanity. It is not a matter of chance that Christ the Lord rose from the dead on Sunday. The light of His Resurrection lit up the morning of the first day of the week. With His rising from the dead, Jesus ushered in a new era in human history. He illuminated the whole earth with the light of the future age.

The Resurrection itself, however, brings with it many questions that still need answering. So many generations of the scholars, theologians, disciples, great minds of this world were trying to give answers, and yet it still remains a secret. And it must be so. Because otherwise Faith would not be necessary to embrace the victory of the Easter morning. It would be enough to just read the chronicle of the events in a daily newspaper, or maybe a Pilate's report or to watch the evening news special.

Victory takes place in us through Faith. After suffering and death, after the pain and uncertainty of tomorrow, there is a Resurrection. Faith raises us up, begins in us a new life, eternal life. The Gospel of life spreads from the empty tomb of Jesus. The Risen One shows that life and Faith are inextricably linked. However, many stones appear in the world that block access to the grace of the Resurrection. Jesus pushes these stones away so that we can enter a life full of joy, hope and freedom.

Jesus is truly risen! Do I believe that I will rise again with Him? " *This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad.* Alleluia!



Easter Sunday is the greatest of all Sundays, and Easter Time is the most important of all liturgical times. Easter is the fulfillment of God's promises to mankind. God promised that through the seed of a woman would come one who would crush the head of Satan. This was the first promise of a Savior and the first great act of God's grace after our tragic act of rebellion and disobedience in the garden of Eden.

Jesus' resurrection marks the triumph of good over evil, sin and death. Jesus' obedience restores our relationship with our loving Father and we live a new life with Christ and look forward to an everlasting life with Him in heaven. Easter Sunday begins the season of Easter which lasts for seven weeks, ending with Pentecost.
