
Fr. Tomasz's Weekly Reflection

Whenever I celebrate a funeral, I usually choose this Gospel passage we hear in today's liturgy: *Do not let your hearts be troubled*. These words evoke warmth, comfort and relief. But then, there is a statement following: *You have faith in God* that can also be read as a sobering question: *Do you believe in God*? If so, keep listening. And if not ... I don't have anything else to say but the *have faith in me* invitation.

I am struck by the response of the apostles, they are completely at loss. *Master, we do not know where you are going; how can we know the way?* - asks my noble namesake. This question is raised at the Last Supper. So this is the graduation from Jesus' school. And Thomas still doesn't understand much, as if he didn't do his homework. How much it resembles us. Today we need a courageous, clear, justified and certain faith. But even if we follow Jesus faithfully, we don't always understand everything. We can ask a question similar to the apostle's: *Lord, what is the right way?* We don't know many things yet, we don't understand. God does not answer all our questions they way we expect, He does not explain everything in detail to us. He teaches us to live and move forward even though we don't have the ultimate certainty and the other questions still ring inside our heads. The answers will come gradually. On the way. God's Truth is received not just through our intellect but also through the experience of life. It requires us to follow Jesus, trying to live like Him. When we look back at the path traveled, from the perspective of years, we often discover the meaning of individual events, we better understand what God meant. When we look ahead, many things are still unclear. But this is how it should be.

Then Philip asks Jesus: *Master, show us the Father, and that will be enough for us.* This request is also close to us. Who of us would not like to see God? If we haven't seen Him already, maybe, like the Apostle, we look for Him in all the wrong places. We search and expect God to be somewhere far away and - in fact - He is closer to us than we think. *Have I been with you for so long a time and you still do not know me, Philip? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father*. Doesn't Jesus say these words to me? How long have I been with Him? How long did I journey with Jesus in my life? How many confessions, Holy Communions, sermons, retreats, prayers, inspirations, meetings? Maybe, like Philip, we expect something extraordinary, unique, and do not recognize God present in our everyday ordinary life?

We are on the way. Every day we move closer to the fullness of truth, to the fullness of life. We don't become Christians in one moment in time, but throughout our entire lives. Our God is not only God with us, He is also God before us. We journey home where there is a place for each of us. Probably till the very end we will ask like Thomas or like Philip: *Lord, we don't know, we don't see, we don't understand, show us the Father, give us more light*. The main thing is, despite those uncertainties, to not stop the journey.



Compassionate and Loving Father,

In the face of confusion and concern impart to us the calm of Your presence.

In You allow us to find hope and healing.

Be with those who serve the sick and give them Your caring hands.

Be with those who lead and give them Your spirit of wisdom.

- Be with those who have fallen ill and give them Your comforting heart.
- Wrap Your arms around our world and hold us in Your love.

Allow us at this time of trial to then serve as instruments of that love to all we meet.
