


Fr. Tomasz's Weekly Reflection

The general consensus is: we work, so we are entitled to payment; like when we want to get something, we pay for it, and expect a good service. In today's Gospel we have an example of how the landowner treated equally - but not necessarily fairly - both those who worked in the sweat and heat of the day from morning till evening, and those who barely had time to begin any work, because it was already pretty much finished for the day. Of course, we cannot blame the workers who came last for not getting their jobs until the end of the day, because they were honestly standing there, waiting for someone to hire them for the entire day. But the accusation and outrage of those tired and burdened workers who did work the whole day was right. They did all the work and they must have felt deeply hurt by the "goodness" of the landowner, who did not take into account the workload when issuing a salary. But we have to understand that this is the case from a purely human point of view.

God's point of view is different. And that doesn't mean it's unfair. God does not count our merits according to time; neither years, nor days, nor hours. God rewards everyone who serves Him voluntarily and lovingly, without any coercion. He gives everyone a chance to convert, whether in youth or old age. And when time comes to pay back for that conversion with His eternal reward, He will not be influenced by any human opinion, envy, jealousy. He is loving and just. First, He knows about the challenges that await His faithful followers, He knows the *day's burden and the heat*, and He is faithful to His promise: we will not lack the graces we need to persevere in a response to our life calling. God never hurts anyone, because what we perceive as a salary is in fact a gift and we should be grateful for it.

The subject of this parable is not the principles of social justice or the laws of the economy, or even the norms of evangelical morality, which require generosity towards the poor and the disadvantaged. Salvation is the central theme of the parable of the workers in the vineyard. Because Salvation is a gift from God, not a payment. Therefore we should not count on our merits, because they will never be enough. We can only put hope in God's mercy, that He Himself will give us what we would never be able to purchase ourselves.

Why does Jesus use the analogy of the salary though? Precisely because we should not think like the Pharisees to whom this Gospel was directed, who felt they should be rewarded by God for their piety, but rather that all we do is a response of love to the greatest gift from God - for Salvation.
