5 – Who is Jesus?

REDEMPTION

Jesus became incarnate, in the flesh, entering His creation.

He shows us how He loved His father so that we would love the Father that way too.

Christ rose from the dead, glorious and immortal, on Easter Sunday, the third day after His death.

Christ ascended, body and soul, into heaven.

Jesus assumed human nature without losing his divine nature

Jesus Christ is not part God, part man.

He is truly God and truly man, in the unity of his divine person

Because Jesus is both God and man, he is the one and only mediator between God and man

The Son of God became man in order to save us by reconciling us with God,

so that we might know God's love, to be our model of holiness, and to make us partakers of the divine nature Jesus Christ, the Son of God, is one divine person who possesses two natures.

He has a divine nature and a human nature, which are united in the one divine person.

This mystery of Christ is the profound union of the divine and human natures in the one person of the Son

Jesus's earthly life reveals his hidden divine Sonship and plan for our salvation.

His parables,

sermons, and

wisdom sayings

help us "to see God made visible, and so we are caught up in love of the God we cannot see".

PARABLES

Jesus's taught with authority.

This is particularly impressive when you consider the fact that Jesus's teachings and stories were so simple. We often have the mistaken view that the more intelligent and complex an idea sounds, the more impressive it is. Jesus didn't see it that way.

The parables of Jesus made the wisdom of God accessible. His teaching wasn't pretentious or unnecessarily complicated. And because of that, Jesus made the kingdom of God attainable for everyone.
