### **STEWARDSHIP CORNER**

#### STEWARDS OF CREATION

The Bible contains a profound message about the stewardship of material creation: God created the world, but entrusts it to human beings. Caring for and cultivating the world involves the following:

- Joyful appreciation for the God-given beauty and wonder of nature;
- Protection and preservation of the environment, which would be the stewardship of ecological concern;
- Respect for human life—shielding life from threat and assault, doing everything that can be done to enhance this gift and make life flourish; and
- Development of this world through noble human effort—physical labor, the trades and professions, the arts and sciences. We call such effort "work." Work is a fulfilling human vocation.

The Second Vatican Council points out that, through work, we build up not only our world but the Kingdom of God, already present among us. Work is a partnership with God—our share in a divine human collaboration in creation. It occupies a central place in our lives as Christian stewards.

#### STEWARDS OF VOCATION

Jesus calls us, as his disciples, to a new way of life—the Christian way of life—of which stewardship is part. But Jesus does not call us as nameless people in a faceless crowd. He calls us individually, by name. Each one of us clergy, religious, lay person; married, single; adult, child has a personal vocation. God intends each one of us to play a unique role in carrying out the divine plan. The challenge, then, is to understand our role—our vocation—and to respond generously to this call from God. Christian vocation entails the practice of stewardship. In addition, Christ calls each of us to be stewards of our personal vocations, which we receive from God. (US Bishops" Pastoral Letter on Stewardship)

# Fr. Tomasz's Weekly Reflection

The liturgy of Palm Sunday, also known as Passion Sunday, shows the culmination of the drama of God who entered human history. The course of events proved that the matter of Jesus of Nazareth was not at all obvious to the people. After all, even among those cheering at His entrance to Jerusalem were those who *did not understand this, asking the question : "Who is this?"* 

In the context of the dramatic events of Holy Week, each and every one of us has to once again answer the question which Christ had already asked his disciples: *And who do you think that I am? The chief priests and scribes – even before answering this question – were already seeking a way to arrest Him by treachery and put him to death. Since it had to be done by treachery, it means that there were no objective reasons for it. Christ for this group of people was simply an obstacle, uncomfortable and dangerous person, because He exposed their weaknesses.* 

The Apostles were also lost in all of this. Not only Judas, who looked for an opportunity to hand him over. Many suspect that for him it was the last opportunity to gain something from his connection with Christ. However, there are also arguments for the thesis that -by his actions -hewanted to force Jesus to take over Israel, not only in a spiritual, but rather in a military manner. In the Garden of Gethsemane, the most important of the Twelve – Peter, James and John, also revealed their human weakness, when they could not persevere with Christ in prayer for even one hour, for they could not keep their eyes open. Eventually, Peter realizes that Christ, in particular, has the right to expect a bold testimony from him. Instinctively, he grasps the sword, but then – also instinctively – capitulates in front of an ordinary, servant woman: I do not know this man about whom you are talking. In the context of the Holy Week experience, those who were supposed to be the pillars have failed.

In contrast, we need to express an admiration and respect for the evangelical extras, characters from the background. For example, a woman with an alabaster jar of perfumed oil, costly genuine spikenard, anointing the body of Christ for his future funeral. Simon of Cyrene, admittedly forced to help, but who finds himself very close to Jesus at this most difficult moment. Women standing near the cross and Joseph of Arimathea, who pleads for the body of Christ. Even the good thief, in the dying scene, teaches us how being close to Jesus makes the whole lot of a difference.

And the final paradox worth noting: when most believers failed, it was the pagan centurion who was the first – before Christ's resurrection – to draw a religious conclusion from what happened at the Calvary hill: *Truly this man was the Son of God! This is the answer God is hoping we will find.*
