Fr. Tomoszis Weekly Reflection

For Christians, the most important commandment is the commandment of love. On the other hand, if someone

For Christians, the most important commandment is the commandment of love. On the other hand, if someone scrupulously obeys all the commandments without love, he or she is far from being truly holy. It is a fake piety that leads to a deception, unfortunately, deceiving not only others, but also oneself. With such attitude, man will never encounter God.

This distortion of placing too much emphasis on external purity rather than the purity of heart – that Jesus pointed out to some of the Pharisees – is repeated also in our day and age. Many are more concerned with the air pollution, the quality of water, the ozone layer, the climate change, while there is silence around the contamination of the heart. We are very careful regarding what enters our mouths: we make sure we only consume fresh products, not expired ones, but do not pay attention to what comes out of them: words that hurt, aggressive language, lies. Isn't this what Jesus refers to as hypocrisy?

We know perfectly well that God's commandments must be kept. Only the one who does justice will live in the presence of the Lord. God does not force us to do anything, but shows that only when we live according to the commandments, can we attain eternal life. However, blind adherence to the rules is not enough, and that is why God has bestowed upon us a Free Will, and wants us to use it in order to open ourselves to His graces, to His Love.

Each of us assumes in our lives a certain direction, a system of values that we follow, which helps us to determine the purpose of life. The Decalogue, this moral foundation, comes from God and is for us, for our true good. If we destroy or reject this foundation, we destroy ourselves. One who abolishes the order of life, the rules of engagement and of human coexistence, ruins an entire system of moral values, and with them also removes the possibility of love.

Today, the lines between good and evil are blurred more than ever before. Seeing what is happening in the world, many say: It is not worth being good; it does not pay off to be righteous. After all, people are calculating, cheating, living as if God did not exist and doing quite well. Those people don't complain very often. On the contrary, those who try to live honestly by keeping God's commandments and the rules of the Church complain quite a bit. This creates a desire to adapt the laws to the life situation and to live by the rule of convenience.

Even so, we have to remember that God does not ask us for the impossible. He tells us to live according to His commandments, and to do it with an attitude of love, even if in the eyes of the world it seems like a bad investment. Therefore, it is worth listening and rethinking today the teaching of the Apostle James: *Humbly welcome the word that has been planted in you and is able to save your souls. Be doers of the word and not hearers only, deluding yourselves.*
