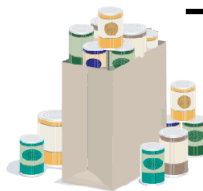

Spiritual Adoption of the Unborn

Roe v. Wade has been overturned, but the unborn still need our prayers. Archbishop Fulton Sheen encouraged us to spiritually adopt an unborn child by saying a short daily prayer for one particular but unknown child's life to be spared abortion. **Our parish will begin this commitment on March 25th, the Feast of the Annunciation of the Lord**, and will continue for 9 months until Christmas. Please consider spiritually adopting an unborn child for yourself and pray for him or her daily. In the bulletin we will provide monthly updates on your baby's development.

Let's Learn About Lent

It's the season of Lent. During Lent we focus on turning away from sin and back to God. Let's look at some of the things in the church related to Lent.

1. What decorations do you see? Are there flowers?
2. What color are the decorations? Did you notice that the priest wears that same color?
3. Do you notice the Stations of the Cross around the walls? Can you find the 1st Station (Jesus is Condemned to Death)?
4. What do you notice about the music during Lent? Is it as upbeat and joyful as the rest of the year?



Join us for a special children's Stations of the Cross on March 24th

1. During Lent, the decorations are simple. There are no flowers.
2. The decorations during Lent are purple. The priest wears purple too. Purple signifies penance, which means making up for our sins.
3. If you are facing the altar, the First Station is to your right. There are 14 Stations in all.
4. The music during Lent is more solemn (more serious and less cheerful). We focus on how Jesus died for our sins.

Fr. Tomasz's Weekly Reflection

Working in the heat of a day, especially if it is a hard, physical work, creates in a man an experience of thirst. This thirst is quenched by water. However, the concept of *thirst* in general is much broader than just a replenishment of liquids in a biological organism: one can thirst for love, for righteousness, for justice, for peace, etc. The whole Bible is full of these and similar expressions.

And in fact, the theme of today's readings is precisely the word *thirst*, appearing in different contexts, with different meanings, not only physical but also spiritual. The passage from the Book of Exodus demonstrates God's care for the people of Israel in the agreement He makes with Moses. On one hand, in this excerpt the term *thirst* appears in its common meaning, but at the same time it becomes an opportunity for God to show how He responds to basic human needs. Moses, who takes responsibility for the people, asks God for help in dealing with the rebellious cries against the Lord. And behold, God commands him: *"Go over there in front of the people, along with some of the elders of Israel, holding in your hand, as you go, the staff with which you struck the river. I will be standing there in front of you on the rock in Horeb. Strike the rock, and the water will flow from it for the people to drink."* This natural human *thirst* was quenched by the water produced in this miracle by God with the help of Moses.

Besides the common meaning of *thirst*, we also experience (or at least we should) a *thirst* for God, thirst for the Eucharist, thirst for His Love, His Grace, His Mercy. This is what St. Paul talks about in his letter to the Romans: *And hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us.* Using the word *hope* Paul expresses this human desire, this emptiness, this longing, this craving, that none but God alone can satisfy.

Finally, in the Gospel, the word *thirst* occurs in all its meanings. In a conversation with the Samaritan woman, Jesus begins by referring to the traditionally practiced gesture of giving a cup of water to a thirsty person, and uses this corporal act of mercy to demonstrate God's love, his compassion, his willingness to provide for all our needs. These words should become the pillars of our earthly pilgrimage and an encouragement to draw directly from the source, just like the people who came to see Jesus and said to the woman: *We no longer believe because of your word; for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the savior of the world.*

Lord, let us feel throughout our lives the desire for Your presence, love, mercy and goodness, so that when we follow Your path, we will remember Your sacrifice for us.
