Spiritual Adoption Begins March 25


Roe v. Wade has been overturned, but the unborn still need our prayers. Archbishop

Fr. Tomasz's Weekly Reflection

In the Gospel Jesus calls the Pharisees blind several times. Moral blindness or spiritual blindness is the narrowing of one's perception to a limited field of view, focusing on certain elements of reality while completely ignoring other important ones. The natural tendency is to develop the areas of our lives we are already good at. But what will become of us when what we are best at turns out to be only looking for someone else's weaknesses? Truly blind is he who does not see his own limitations, but sees everyone else as more inadequate than himself.

The Greek word translated as *clay* in today's Gospel would probably be better interpreted as *mud*, because it denotes a dirty, sticky, and moist substance. However, colloquially and metaphorically it was also used to tell someone they are stupid. Stupidity, in this context, is not someone's intellectual limitation, but rather an obstinate perversion. Wouldn't we get annoyed at someone who puts a coffee cup on the table that has only been cleaned on the outside, while the inside is covered with months of greasy stains that are already blooming with mold, and at the same time they tell us wrongly that it was because of our unwashed fingers? Or how would we react to the cries of someone who accused us of soiling the carpet with wet muddy shoes during the drought, when in reality they hadn't cleaned it in a long time?

Jesus says in the famous speech against the Pharisees in Matthew 23: Blind Pharisee, cleanse first the inside of the cup, so that the outside also may be clean. Elsewhere, with equal exasperation, he argues that nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person; but the things that come out from within are what defile. (Mark 7:14) And when the disciples reported to Jesus that the Pharisees took offense at him, he emphatically said: let them alone; they are blind guides [of the blind]. If a blind person leads a blind person, both will fall into a pit. (Matthew 15:14) Could not the one who healed the blind man who had been blind from birth open the eyes of the Pharisees as well? It is easier to heal a blind man from a disability than a man from the stupidity of hypocrisy. The most common signs of this kind of hypocritical stupidity are preoccupation with the sins of others, a fixation on someone else's faults rather than one's own, or naive appeals to religious prohibitions and rules.

The healing of the blind man in today's Gospel passage was intended to help the Pharisees open their own eyes to their moral blindness. But even a visible miracle is of little help to someone who is blind to himself. On the contrary, the indication of a conscience being healthy is thinking about one's own moral situation, not about correcting others. And that's why at the moment I'm thinking about myself and not about anyone else. I think of my own blind judgments, gossip, accusations, outrages, scandals, suspicions. After all, when I stand before the mighty tribunal, God will not ask me about the sins of others, only about mine. And above all, nothing will outrage Him more than my indignation at others, not at myself.
