

Fr. Tomasz's Weekly Reflection

Today, we reflect on one of the greatest mysteries of our faith: the Holy Trinity. The idea of three persons in one God is beyond human comprehension. We cannot fully explain it, yet Scripture reveals its truth, and faith allows us to embrace it.

In the Gospel of John, Jesus tells His disciples that there is much they cannot yet bear, but the Spirit of Truth will guide them. This passage reminds us that divine truths are not always immediately grasped by human reason. The Trinity is one such truth – beyond logic, yet deeply real.

The Book of Proverbs speaks of Wisdom, present before creation, delighting in the world and humanity. This Wisdom is personified in Christ, the Son of God, through whom all things were made. The Spirit, too, was present at creation, hovering over the waters. And the Father is the source of all. Though distinct, they are one.

Saint Paul, in Letter to the Romans, speaks of faith leading to peace with God. Faith does not require proof - it seeks understanding but does not depend on it. If we could fully explain God, we would no longer need faith. Instead, we trust in what has been revealed.

The Trinity is only one of many mysteries about God that surpass human reasoning. We cannot fully grasp it, yet we believe. God's ways are beyond us, yet He invites us to trust Him. We do not need proof to believe – faith is not about certainty but about trust in the One who has revealed Himself. As Saint Anselm said, "Faith seeks understanding," but he also stated: "I do not seek to understand in order that I may believe, but rather, I believe in order that I may understand".

If you ever struggle to understand God, know that you are not alone. We all wrestle with the limits of human reason, trying to grasp the infinite. But faith is not about having all the answers – it is about trusting in God's wisdom, even when we don't fully comprehend His ways. Rather than worrying about what we cannot explain, let us surrender to His truth with humility, knowing that His love and presence are always with us, even in uncertainty.

Ultimately, the Trinity is not a puzzle to solve but a mystery to embrace. Let us believe, even when we do not fully understand, and trust in the wisdom of God.



- St. Ignatius called the Church "catholic," which means universal. He also believed in the importance of Scripture and Tradition to pass on the faith.
- St. Irenaeus emphasized that "apostolic succession" was the "ultimate guarantor of truth, meaning primarily the transmission of authentic apostolic teachings from generation to generation through a line of bishops."
- Since the Church taught that Divine Revelation ended with the death of the last Apostle, St John, any ideas or teachings that appeared new must "be found, at least implicitly, in truths already believed."
- St. Clement, Origen, and others said that divine truth could be found in both Scripture and Tradition. Some teachings, like the Assumption of Mary, and Mary as ever-virgin, were passed down through Tradition and are not explicitly stated in the Bible.
- The pope, the Bishop of Rome, was called upon to settle disagreements within the Church.
- Hippolytus "supported the claim that ultimate authority resides in the duly ordained officers of the Church, independent of their personal worthiness."
- Bishops in the early Church were elected locally, but their appointment also required "the laying on of hands by other bishops...Thus each local church had to keep an exact record of the spiritual lineage of its bishops."
- There were other minor orders by the 3rd Century, such as doorkeepers, exorcists, acolytes (messengers who brought Communion to the sick), sub-deacons, deacons, and priests. There were also lectors who would read Scripture during the liturgy.
- The early Church already had transitional deacons and permanent deacons. Deacons could distribute Communion, baptize, and preach homilies.
- The early Christians celebrated Mass as well. St. Justin Martyr "described the liturgy of the Eucharist as consisting of prayers, a greeting of peace, the presentation of gifts, thanksgiving, and the reception of Communion."
- Early Christians all believed that the Eucharist was actually the Body and Blood of Jesus. They also "proclaimed the sacrificial nature of the Eucharist...the Church transformed the sacrificial worship of the Jews with Jesus as the unbloody sacrifice who replaces the holocaust of animals."

Saint Thomas More

Feast: June 22nd

Patron of lawyers, civil servants, politicians, adopted children, difficult marriages

Quick Facts

- Was born in 1478 in London
- His father, Sir John More, was a lawyer and judge
- Studied at Oxford
- Became a lawyer in 1502, but felt drawn to religious life; he lived next to a monastery and the monks inspired his faith.
- Had 4 children
- Elected to Parliament in 1504
- Wrote Utopia, a story about a fictional idealistic island society.
- King Henry VIII was drawn to Thomas More, and gave him higher positions in the government, eventually making him Lord Chancellor. More and the King had a close loyal relationship.
- But when King Henry VIII wanted to divorce his wife Catherine, Thomas More would not support him.
- Thomas More felt that Henry had fallen from the Church, and opposed him wanting to break off into his own church.
- In 1534 More refused to take an oath acknowledging Henry as the head of the Church of England. He was imprisoned, tried for treason, and eventually beheaded.
- Thomas More is considered to be a man "of deep piety, asceticism, voluntary self-discipline, and penitence." (catholic.org)
- Canonized a saint in 1935

THE TRINITY

"God is one **being** who exists as three **persons**, each of whom fully possess the divine **nature**."

"The Trinity can't be grasped if we think of "beings" and "persons" as the same thing. If we recognize that there are **beings that are zero persons** (such as rocks and trees) and there are **beings that are one person** (such as humans and angels), then we see that there could be **a being that is three persons**, or God."
