

Fr. Tomasz's Weekly Reflection

Today's readings invite us to rediscover the beauty and simplicity of God's law, not as a burdensome set of rules, but as a clear and life-giving path written into our hearts and revealed perfectly in Jesus Christ. The commandments are not arbitrary or obscure; they are practical, accessible, and deeply human. And in the parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus shows us that the heart of the law is love – love that acts, love that crosses boundaries, love that heals.

In Deuteronomy, Moses speaks to the people with striking clarity: "This command that I enjoin on you today is not too mysterious and remote for you... No, it is something very near to you, already in your mouths and in your hearts." God's law is not hidden in the heavens or buried in the depths, it is woven into the fabric of our being. We are not asked to decipher riddles or perform impossible feats. We are asked to love, to choose life, to walk humbly with our God.

Saint Paul, writing to the Colossians, lifts our gaze to Christ, "the image of the invisible God... in whom all things were created." This is the One through whom the law was given, and in whom it finds its fulfillment. When Christ became incarnate, He did not abolish the law, He embodied it. He showed us what it looks like to live the commandments: not as inert prescriptions, but as a way of being that brings peace, reconciliation, and communion. In Jesus, the law becomes flesh and walks among us.

And then, in the Gospel, Jesus tells a story. A man is beaten and left for dead. Religious figures pass by, perhaps preoccupied with ritual purity or theological correctness. But a Samaritan, an outsider, a man of no religious standing, stops. He sees, he feels compassion, he acts. He binds wounds, carries burdens, pays the cost. This is not abstract morality. This is love in motion. And Jesus says, "Go and do likewise."

The parable is not a lofty ideal, it is a practical illustration of the commandment to love our neighbor. It shows that God's law is not confined to the temple or the scroll: it is lived on the road, in the interruptions, in the inconvenient moments where mercy is needed.

God's commandments are not rules for rules' sake. They are invitations to live as we were created to live: in love, in truth, in communion. They are clear, near, and made visible in Christ. And when we follow them, we do not just obey - we become vessels of grace, like the Good Samaritan, bringing healing to a wounded world.

Let us ask for the grace to see God's law not as a burden, but as a gift. May we live it with clarity, with courage, and with compassion.



The Church Fathers (Last Week) The Church in the Middle Ages

The Protestant Reformation Part 1 (Next Week)


- 476 A.D. was the year that the Western Roman Empire collapsed, leading to the start of the Middle Ages. The Eastern part of the Empire, called the Byzantine Empire, continued.
- Various Germanic tribes migrated to what was the Western Empire: groups such as the Huns, Ostrogoths, Vandals, Franks, Angles, Saxons, and more. This period saw smaller governments spring up from the remains of the Empire.
- Monasticism was very popular during the Early Middle Ages, around 500s to 1000s.
- One of the most famous saints of the period was St. Patrick, who evangelized Ireland.
- Saint Benedict was another popular saint of this age; he founded many monasteries and established the Rule, which were guidelines for monks and nuns. The Rule also stressed the importance of prayer and work.
- The Church flourished during the early Middle Ages because of their organized structure. "The formation of a Christian legal system, adapted from Roman law, marked the first time in history that there existed, anywhere, an autonomous, self-governing body distinct from the state." (Hitchcock)
- Pope St. Gregory the Great advocated for peaceful missions to the various Germanic tribes. He was also the first to concretely define the doctrine of Purgatory.
- Muslim invasions and conquests caused strife for the people of the early Middle Ages.
- For a time the rulers of the Eastern empire and the popes of the Church worked closely together, the popes crowning the emperors. This led to abuses like the emperors trying to elect the popes. Pope St. Leo IX helped to reform papal elections.
- Pope St. Gregory VII also implemented many reforms by asserting the authority of the pope over the Church, not emperors.
- Pope Leo IX, Pope Gregory VII, and Pope Urban II sought to reform abuses in the Church such as "the interference of secular rulers...the abuse of simony [buying and selling Church offices].
- Some events that set the stage for the Protestant Reformation were the papacy moving to France (1309-1378), and the Great Schism (1378-1417).

Eucharistic Miracle Spotlight

Morne-Rouge, Caribbean Island of Martinique, 1902

On May 8th, 1902, Mount Pelee Volcano began erupting. The faithful of the island, who had a strong devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus,



rushed to the church and asked for confession. The parish priest, Fr. Mary, gave a general absolution, distributed Holy Communion, and exposed the Blessed Sacrament for adoration. During adoration, many witnessed an image of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in the Host, and they also saw blood dripping from his heart. The vision lasted for several hours, and the village of Morne-Rouge was miraculously spared from the volcano. Later that year another volcano did destroy the village, but in May, the people got a chance to receive the Sacraments in preparation for death and also to see a vision of the Sacred Heart.

- Was friends with St. Thomas Aquinas
- Was chosen as the General of his order at age 35.

- Was Cardinal and Bishop of Albano, one of the sees of Rome.
- Is a Doctor of the Church
