

Fr. Tomasz's Weekly Reflection

Today's readings draw us into the quiet mystery of hospitality – not merely as an act of service, but as a posture of the soul. True hospitality is not measured by how much we do, but by how deeply we receive. It is not about the perfection of our homes, but the openness of our hearts. Welcoming God means making space – not just in our schedules or our routines, but in the very core of our being.

In Genesis, Abraham welcomes three strangers under the oaks of Mamre. He rushes to prepare food, water, and rest. But this is no ordinary visit. These guests carry a divine promise: *"Your wife Sarah shall have a son."* Abraham's hospitality becomes the setting for revelation. He does not know at first that he is entertaining the Lord, yet his openness allows grace to enter. The encounter is not in the meal alone, but in the presence he offers – his attentiveness, his readiness to receive.

In Luke's Gospel, we meet Martha and Mary. Martha, like Abraham, is busy with service. She is doing what seems right – preparing, hosting, working. But Jesus gently redirects her: *"You are anxious and worried about many things. There is need of only one thing."* Mary, who sits at His feet and listens, has chosen the better part. Not because service is wrong, but because presence is essential. Hospitality begins not with action, but with attention. Mary's stillness becomes a sanctuary for Christ.

Saint Paul, writing to the Colossians, speaks of a deeper hospitality still: "*The mystery hidden for ages*... *Christ in you, the hope of glory*." This is the ultimate welcome – not of a guest into our home, but of God into our very lives. Paul rejoices in his sufferings because he knows that the Gospel is not just a message to be preached, but a Person to be received. Christ dwells in us, not as a visitor, but as the One who transforms us from within.

Hospitality, then, is not about doing more – it is about being more present. It is about creating space for God to speak, to act, to dwell. In our homes, yes – but also in our conversations, our silence, our prayer. It is about listening before responding, receiving before giving. It is about recognizing that God often comes disguised – in the stranger, in the interruption, in the quiet moment we almost overlook.

Let us learn from Abraham, who welcomed mystery; from Mary, who chose presence; and from Paul, who bore Christ within. May we become people of true hospitality – not just in our homes, but in our hearts. May we make space for grace, and in doing so, discover that the One we welcome is already waiting to welcome us.



The Protestant Reformation part 2 (Next Week)

- Granting indulgences was a long-standing practice in the Church. "Sin is a freely willed offense against God and neighbor. God forgives the guilt of sin through the sacrament of penance. But justice demands reparation—that is, temporal punishment for the harm caused by sin. By virtue of the authority given to it by Christ, then, the Church may assign penitential acts that will lessen (indulge) or completely erase the temporal punishment for sins." (Weidenkopf)
- The Church is still led by sinners, and many priests and bishops abused the practice of giving indulgences, sometimes granting them to people who contributed to the costs of a building, such as the rebuilding of St. Peter's Basilica.
- Events such as moving the papacy to Avignon, France, as well as the Great Western Schism, which happened when three different men claimed to be the pope, helped to set the stage for the Protestant Reformation.
- The Church was undoubtedly in need of reform in several areas, but Martin Luther's mistake was in questioning the authority of the pope and the Church, not in questioning the abuses of Church teaching.
- The threat of Muslims against the Eastern Empire as well as the nobility desiring Church property helped the Protestants to break away from the Church.
- "The Church attempted to reform itself long before Luther and Calvin, but poor leadership from the papacy prevented the reforms from taking root. True reform comes from within, and seeks to preserve what is good. Revolution is an external action that aims at destroying an institution and creating something wholly new. The leaders of the Protestant movement were revolutionaries who sought the complete destruction of the Church [which ultimately failed]." (Weidenkopf)
- One of the Reformers' claims was that the Church didn't want the common people to read the Bible for themselves. But this was not true. In the 300s St. Jerome translated the Bible from Hebrew and Greek into Latin, and by Luther's time there were numerous vernacular translations of the Bible.
- It was bad translations of the Bible led to heresies like Arianism (denied the divinity of Jesus). John Wycliffe used his own translation of Scripture to justify various heresies.

Saint Mary Magdalene

Feast: July 22nd

Quick Facts

- Mentioned multiple times in the Gospels as a follower of Jesus during his public ministry
- It is not certain whether the woman caught in adultery in the Gospels or the woman who washes Jesus' feet with her tears are Mary Magdalene.
- The Gospel does say that Jesus cast seven demons out of her.
- She was present at Jesus' crucifixion, and was one of the first to see him after he rose from the dead. She was among one of the early Christians.
- Legend says that she spent the last years of her life in a cave in France

Saint Sharbel (Charbel)

Feast: July 24 Patron of



Quick Facts

- Born Youssef Antoun Makhlouf in 1828 in North Lebanon
- Became a monk in 1851 and took the name Charbel.
- Lived much of his life as a hermit, was regarded as holy and obedient
- Died on December 24, 1898 after having a stroke 8 days before.
- After his burial, people reported seeing lights around his grave. His tomb was opened, and his body was found incorrupt, exuding sweat and blood.
- His body was placed inside the monastery where many people were healed by his intercession.
- The next time his tomb was opened, his body was still incorrupt, and the number of healings increased.
- His body continued to sweat and bleed for 65 years after his death.
- Canonized in 1977
- Even today countless healings have been attributed to his intercession.
