

Fr. Tomasz's Weekly Reflection

Last Sunday, we reflected on the nature of true hospitality – how welcoming God means making space in our lives, not just in our homes. Today, we continue that theme of openness, but now in the context of prayer. The readings invite us to approach God not with demands or expectations, but with trust, persistence, and humility. We are reminded that God is never tired of hearing us, and we should never grow weary of asking Him.

In Genesis, Abraham stands before the Lord and dares to plead for Sodom. He does not presume to instruct God, nor does he claim to know better. Instead, he approaches with reverence and boldness: "*I am but dust and ashes*." Yet he continues to ask – again and again – lowering the number of righteous needed to spare the city. And what's striking is not just Abraham's persistence, but God's response. Each time, the Lord listens. Each time, He agrees. Though Sodom is ultimately destroyed, Abraham's prayer was not ignored – it was honored. God engaged with him, heard him, and responded with patience and mercy, as He didn't destroy the righteous with the sinners.

In Luke's Gospel, the disciples ask Jesus to teach them how to pray. He gives them the words we know so well – the Our Father – but He doesn't stop there. He tells a parable about a man who knocks at midnight, asking for bread. The message is clear: "Ask and you will receive; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you." Jesus is not offering a formula for success, but a relationship of trust. He assures us that God is not a reluctant giver. If we, flawed as we are, know how to give good gifts to our children, "how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask Him?"

Saint Paul, in his letter to the Colossians, reminds us that we have already received the greatest gift: "You were buried with Him in baptism... God made you alive with Christ." Our sins are forgiven, our debt canceled, our lives renewed. This is not the result of our eloquence or persistence – it is pure grace. And yet, even with this gift already given, we are invited to keep asking. Not because God forgets, but because prayer deepens our relationship with Him. It opens us to grace, aligns our hearts with His will, and reminds us that we are never alone.

So, let us not be embarrassed to ask for the same things again and again. Healing. Peace. Strength. Forgiveness. These are not selfish requests – they are signs of our dependence on God. And He is never tired of providing. Even when the answer is not what we expect, even when the outcome seems unchanged, God is listening. He is responding. Sometimes with comfort, sometimes with challenge, always with love.



The Protestant Reformation part 1 (Last Week) **The Protestant Reformation part 2** Actual Church Teaching on Salvation (Next Week)

- Martin Luther was born in 1480. His overbearing father wanted him to study law, but he decided to become an Augustinian monk.
- "Luther suffered throughout his life from various physical and spiritual problems. He was desperate for certain knowledge of his own salvation, and came to believe that it is through faith alone that one is saved. He adopted the heresy that Scripture alone is the authoritative source of divine revelation." Luther had a negative view of God and so took issue with the authority of the pope.
- His Ninety-Five Theses which he posted on the door of the church in Wittenberg, Germany, did address ecclesiastical abuses within the Church, but he also said that the pope had no authority to grant indulgences at all, which was heresy. Luther was asked to recant his heresies, but refused.
- Luther also wrote several documents encouraging violence against Jews, the pope and cardinals, and others.
- John Calvin was another of the most prominent revolutionaries of the Protestant Reformation. He began a "war against joy" in Geneva, France. He advocated for the death penalty for many sins and outlawed dancing, singing, jewelry, and games.
- Calvin had Michael Servetus, a fellow Protestant, put to death when his opinions did not agree with Calvin's.
- Calvin also believed in predestination, which said that only a handful of people would be saved, and everyone else was condemned no matter what they did.
- The Protestant Revolution led to much violence throughout Europe. Churches were robbed and the Eucharist desecrated. Various countries used Protestantism as a weapon to take advantage of their rival countries.
- "The effects of the Protestant Revolution were devastating politically and spiritually." Many new nations were created who opposed the authority of the Catholic Church.
- "Spiritually, the Revolution's principle of private judgment and private interpretation of Scripture led ultimately to the worship of self and the rise of nationalism, in which the state is exalted above the Church has the supreme authority in all things, to disastrous effect."

- Born in Imola, Italy in 380
- The Bishop of Imola, Cornelius, baptized, educated, and made Peter a deacon.
- Became a bishop in 433
- Helped to expel paganism from his diocese
- Was known for simple, practical, and clear homilies, came to be called Chrysologus which means "golden-worded."
- Died in 450
- Many of his homilies were recorded and handed down to others.
- He is a Doctor of the Church.
