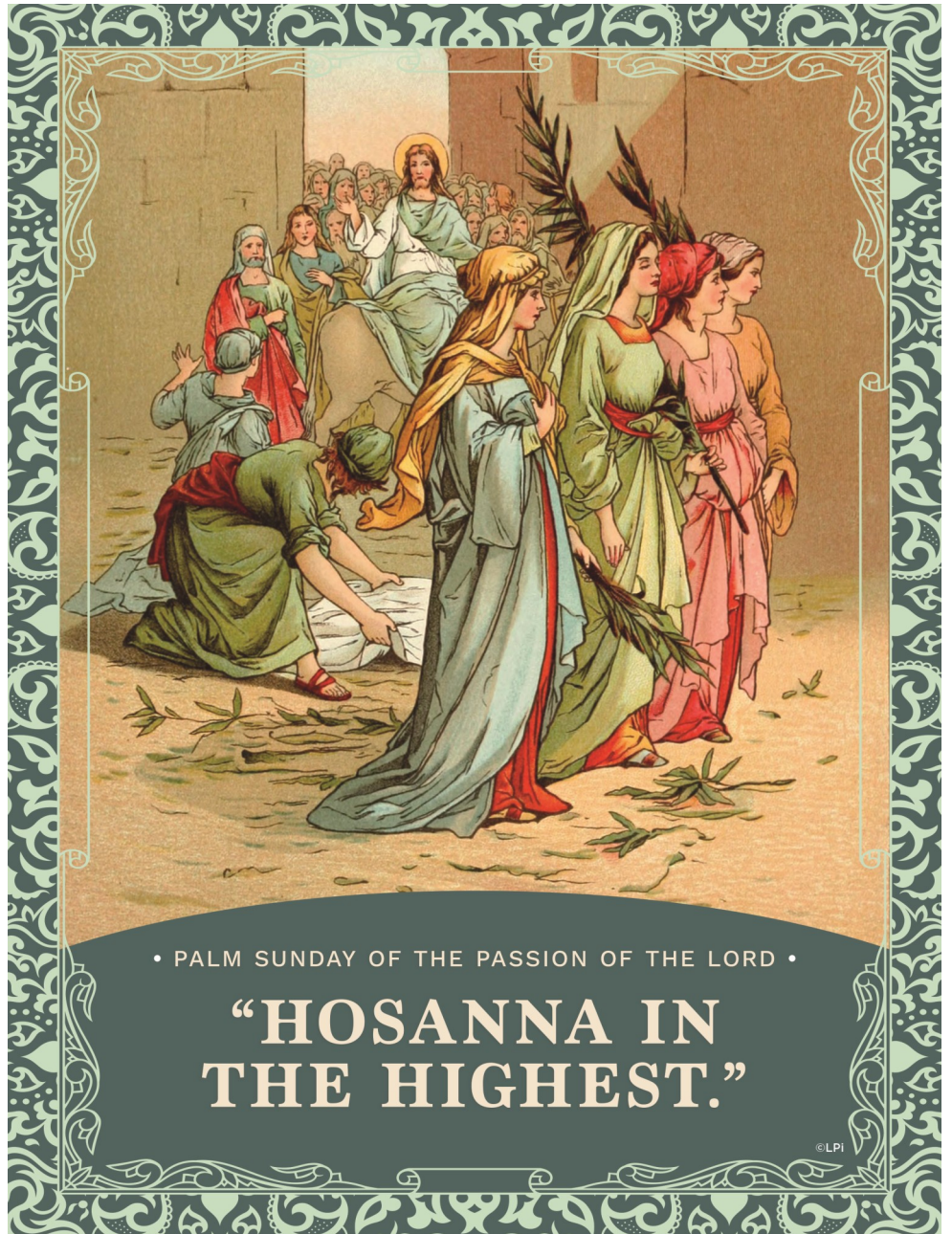

Fr. Tomasz's Weekly Reflection

Today's liturgy is full of tension. We begin with triumph: branches raised, voices shouting "Hosanna!", and we end with the silence of the tomb. That tension is not accidental. It runs through every reading, and it runs through the heart of the Christian life: the tension between doing God's will and suffering.

The Scriptures today make something very clear: God does not cause suffering. He does not delight in pain, humiliation, or violence. But He allows suffering to touch our lives, and in those moments He calls us to discern His will more deeply, not less. The question is never, "Why is God doing this to me?" The real question is, "How is God asking me to follow Him through this?"

Isaiah gives us the first glimpse of this mystery. The Servant of the Lord is faithful, obedient, and innocent, yet he is struck, insulted, and rejected. And still he says, "*The Lord God is my help.*" He does not say, "The Lord God will remove the suffering." He says, "The Lord God will give me the strength to endure it." That is what it means to be heard by God.

Saint Paul takes us deeper. Christ "*emptied himself,*" accepting the path the Father placed before Him. His obedience did not shield Him from suffering, it led Him directly into it. But that same obedience is what led Him to glory. The Resurrection is not the avoidance of suffering; it is the victory that comes through it. One has to die, to be risen from the dead.

Jesus does not run from the Cross. He does not negotiate with it. He does not redesign the Father's plan. He enters into suffering with full clarity and full freedom. He suffers because He is doing the Father's will, not because the Father desires His pain. And in that obedience, He reveals the deepest truth of the Christian life: Being heard by God does not mean suffering disappears. It means God gives us the strength to overcome it.

Palm Sunday confronts us with a choice. The crowds followed their own designs: they wanted a Messiah who fit their expectations, a king who would conquer without suffering. When Jesus refused to follow their plan, they turned on Him. Their path led to condemnation. Meanwhile, Jesus followed the Father's will, even when it led to betrayal, injustice, and death. His path led to Resurrection.

So, the question for us today is simple and demanding: Whose will do we follow when suffering comes? As we enter Holy Week, let us ask for one grace: the courage to follow God's will in every moment of our lives.

What did Jesus do on the cross?

On Good Friday JESUS was taken before King HEROD and the governor, PILATE. Even though He had not committed any crime He was scourged and condemned to die on the CROSS. He CARRIED the cross as far as He could up CALVARY hill, but when He got too weak a man named SIMON of CYRENE was forced to help Him. On the way He met His mother, MARY, who WEPT at seeing her Son in such pain. A woman named VERONICA wiped the blood and sweat from His face with a cloth. At the top of the HILL Jesus was thrown onto the cross and His HANDS and FEET were fastened to it with NAILS. They raised the cross, where Jesus hung for three hours before He DIED. He did all this to SAVE us from Hell. At the cross were JOHN, Mary MAGDALENE, His mother, and some other women. At the moment He died the curtain of the old Temple was TORN in half. When His body was taken down from the cross JOSEPH of Arimathea and NICODEMUS BURIED Him in a new TOMB and rolled a HEAVY STONE in front of the door.

“I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ”

- “All of distinctively Christian faith begins and ends with a particular person, Jesus from Nazareth, recognized to be the Son of God.”
- Jews, Muslims, and others might profess belief in “the existence of God, creation, and providence,” but only Christians believe that Jesus is the Son of God.
- The name Jesus is *Ieshuah* in Hebrew, which means “Yahweh saves.”
- “The name at the heart of Christian faith compels us to acknowledge both that God is incomparably good (for he is in the business of saving) and that something has gone wrong with God’s good creation (for it needs saving).”
- The word “Savior” comes from the Latin word “Salvator,” which means “the bearer of *salus* or health.” The English word “salve” is related to it. Essentially Jesus is the one who heals the wounds caused by sin.
- The word “Christ” comes from the Greek word “Christos,” which means “the anointed one.” The word anointed was commonly associated with King David, the greatest of Israel’s kings.
- While David did partially fulfill the role in leading the people to a right relationship with God, he did sin seriously. Only a Messiah could truly bring God’s love to the world.
- “Somehow Yahweh, the God of Israel, would indeed come to set things right and that he would do so through the instrumentality of a human being, the act of salvation involving both divine and human agency.”

“The only begotten Son of God”

- “Son of God carries the sense of close rapport with God, or deep friendship with God, or familial belonging to him.” Those who have an encounter with God throughout Scripture are also sent forth to bring God to others around them. Therefore Jesus was sent by God the Father.
- “Jesus’ sonship and his status as the One Sent are qualitatively different than those of any other figure in the biblical tradition. Moses, Isaiah, Ezekiel, David, and Abraham might have seen themselves as servants of the God of Israel...but none of them ever saw himself as operating in the very person of the God of Israel, doing and saying what only God could legitimately say and do.”
